Biographical Note

Pedro Teques is a professor in sport and exercise psychology at the University of Trás-os-Montes and Alto Douro (UTAD), Portugal. He graduated in psychology with a specialization in sport psychology and later completed his MS and PhD in sport and exercise psychology at the Faculty of Human Kinetics, University of Lisbon. In 2009, he was awarded the prize for best student at the University of Lisbon, and one of his PhD studies received the Young Investigators Award at the annual congress of the Portuguese Society of Sport Psychology (SPPD) in 2014.

Since 2014, Pedro has been actively engaged in the leadership of the SPPD, serving as Secretary-General, Vice-President, and currently as President for the 2022-2026 term. He has promoted international collaborations, organized annual scientific events, and led initiatives that bridge science, applied practice, and community engagement.

Author or co-author of more than 50 peer-reviewed papers on psychosocial influences on sport performance and development, Pedro is also a chartered clinical, health, and sport psychologist with the Order of Portuguese Psychologists. Over the past two decades, he has consulted with coaches, parents, athletes, and referees in sports such as football, handball, gymnastics, trap shooting, and racing cars. He currently works full-time with the Referees' Committee of the Portuguese Football Federation.

Alongside his academic and applied roles, Pedro is an active endurance athlete, regularly participating in half marathons and marathons. He has consistently followed parallel paths, integrating applied practice, research, and the lived experience of sport, while actively contributing to the advancement of sport psychology.

Position Statement
